• The Youth and Family Project, Inc. - \$1,525

• Nominee #1 donated to the Gingerbread House, which is an annual event that is held to help get resources for the less fortunate in their county to meet their basic needs in order to celebrate the holiday season with lasting, cherished memories. This program is a huge hit that is embraced by the entire community and has become a local holiday tradition.

• Big Brothers Big Sisters of Local County - \$250

 Big Brothers Big Sisters is a non-profit organization that offers mentorship programs to local youth, promoting and developing positive relationships that have a direct and lasting effect for the youth involved. Nominee #1 helps fund and promote their events to help boost their success and make sure every youth has an opportunity for a brighter future.

• Local Fire Department - \$1,250

• Nominee #1's community has several big and small fire departments that they help throughout the year. Not only by donating money towards their calendars to promote fire prevention, but also participating in their local blood drives, and other local events. They also donate their facility for them to perform their training. When Nominee #1 has junk cars in their impound lot, the fire department comes with their trucks and equipment to train new employees on vehicle extrication and using the "Jaws of Life" hydraulic extrication tool properly. Soldiers Angels – 14,000 pairs of socks

• Nominee #4 has collected over 14,000 pairs of socks and donated them to Soldiers Angels based out of their home state. Soldiers Angels runs a program called Warm Feet for Warriors, shipping new socks to active military all over the world. Multiple organizations helped Nominee #4 accomplish this including: Friendly Sons Of St. Patrick, Bombas sock company, local Police Departments, Multiple BNI chapters, and multiple generous members of Nominee #4's county.

Toys for Tots

• The first Friday of every December, Nominee #4 hosts a toy drive. During the drive, free meals are provided to the community. All toys collected are donated to the Marine Corps Reserve for their annual Toys for Tots drive. Nominee #4 fills 2-4 boxes a year for the Marine Corps.

Local High School Wrestling - \$250

• Every year, Nominee #4 donates \$250 to the local high school wrestling program. This donation helps to provide gear for the team members.

• The Friendly Sons of St. Patrick - \$2,750

• Nominee #4 is the president of the local Friendly Sons of St Patrick, a philanthropic organization that donates time and money to their local communities underserved. Nominee #4 and their team have personally helped to move elderly citizens out of their unsafe apartments, provided dire medical equipment to underserved disabled children, and regularly raised money/devoted time to working closely with their local Family Success Center. The Family Success Center provides much needed resources to homeless families/ women/children/ and resources for recovering addicts. Working with the FSSP, Nominee #4 delivered 6,000 pounds of food to the Family Success Center using their tow truck.

Boy Scouts/Girl Scouts

• Nominee #4's shop invites local boy and girl scouts to come to their shop and teach them about vehicle safety.

• I Love You More - \$6,000

• Nominee #4 works closely with two organizations, the local breast cancer screening office, and the I Love You More foundation. Nominee #4 hosts an annual cornhole tournament to raise money for the I Love You More foundation. This foundation donates money to women who cannot afford mammograms. To date Nominee #4 has raised \$6,000.

Nominee #4's Shop

- Nominee #4's shop chooses to allocate several working days per year for other local endeavors:
 - The team takes a day off a few times a year to clean and plant new flowers at their Welcome to Town signs.
 - The team is currently collecting diapers for the Family Success Center to help families in the neighboring area who cannot afford these items.
 - The team takes a day off to lend a helping hand to the Grow-a-Row Foundation. Picking vegetables and fruits that are donated to inner cities. These foods are given away to families in need to ensure healthy meals can be prepared.
 - Nominee #4 repairs vehicles to help families suffering hardships. This allows the families to get back and forth to work.
 - The team donates time to the local Clinton Red Mill for the Halloween attraction every October.



Structured Apprentice Program

• Nominee #5 put together an apprenticeship program that walks candidates through a 6-month program dedicated to their personal growth supported with industry currency. Nominee #5 supplied \$2,000 worth of tools, enrolled them in unlimited annual i-Car training, & surrounded them with a staff dedicated to personal development and mentorship. The most recent apprentice was hired directly after graduating from high school with NO previous work history. Today, after just one year, he is cross-trained in multiple departments and was awarded team member of the year by his peers. The environment that these students create is energetic and the symbolic representation of training placed throughout the shop, mixed with the pride for the industry, is reinforced within the team members with each new apprentice they bring on.

Local Technical College

• Nominee #5 has arranged an annual board meeting where they have rounded up six other shop owners to attend a round table discussion on the program's potential. What's currently working and what's not. The administration team has been very supportive and shocked at all Nominee #5 has been able to accomplish with very little funding in such a short time. Nominee #5 has provided Mid Florida Tech with their in-house 6-month apprenticeship program to onboard employees internally who haven't had any automotive experience before joining their team. This apprenticeship program is currently being broken down into semesters and is slowly replacing the current program's curriculum. The students are working toward proper damage analysis and the shop owners are reporting their feedback during internships. Nominee #5 plans to continue to polish the model, prove its results and demonstrate nationwide what a little investigating and persistence to get to the right people can do to our industry's staffing concerns. All while providing exceptional opportunities for the students and all the administration involved.

Embrace Families

• Under this partnership, Nominee #5's team members have volunteered time, energy and attention towards a structured legacy Mentorship Program designed to help mentor foster children potentially interested within our industry. This relationship has been mutually beneficial as it pushes Nominee #5's team into areas of vulnerability, while experiencing coaching and mentoring young adults. The team establishes lifelong relationships with young adults striving to grow and find themselves. The program provides them access to eager interns looking to experience firsthand what it's like to work in our industry and, most importantly, determine if it's the career path they would be interested in. Nominee #5 is excited to have several candidates scheduled to join them this summer to execute a new training.

Society of Collision Repair Specialist

• Nominee #5 has been an active member of the Society of Collision Repair Specialists over the last several years. The amount of support and dedication the SCRS has toward innovation and specific operational industry changes has been revolutionary. Nominee #5's contributions are paid monthly with great pride, and the team regularly recommends their membership to their peer shop owners.

Colonial High School

• In the last several years, Nominee #5 has worked closely with the Auto Body Shop Program held at Colonial High School. After several visits, Nominee #5 realized the instructors had very little guidance for the curriculum and equipment that would best position the students for a potential career within our industry. Nominee #5 set out to get the attention of whoever oversaw making updates to the curriculum to connect the students' teachers and administration team with missed opportunities. The students have responded very well, and a new energy has overcome the classes. As Nominee #5 works with the program on continual improvement and implementation, the students respond with higher attendance rates, the highest engagement the 6-year teacher has seen, and the class has formed a waiting list!

Central Florida Soap Box Derby

• Nominee #5's involvement with the Central Florida Soapbox Derby Boys and Girls Club, was not only eyeopening, it was life-changing. It started during small talk with one of their regulars, who mentioned that a
group of specially challenged and or foster children traveling for a Soap Box Derby race had an accident on
their way back from a Derby event held in Ohio. The accident resulted in a van traveling with the teams'
coaches, several children, and most of their equipment losing control on the highway. As soon as Nominee #5
heard the story, he contacted the team and offered anything they could do to help. The conversation resulted
in having the opportunity for Nominee #5's team to meet the racers and invite them to the shop to pick out
colors and paint schemes that were specific to their personalities and style. All ten Soap Box Derby race cars
were restored and painted per their request. Seeing the look on the kids' faces when Nominee #5 returned
their race cars was something Nominee #5 will never forget. Nominee #5's team visited their next local race.
The entire experience and story will be something that will stick with Nominee #5 and their team forever, the
children's attitudes toward the catastrophe after everything had come full circle was inspirational.

National Auto Body Council

 Nominee #5 has been a member of the National Auto Body Council for the last several years and strongly believes in its core principles and the support they provide to families in need. Nominee #5 has voluntarily offered several vehicles to the Recycled Rides program so far, none of which have met the program requirements; however, they look forward to being a part of a family in needs story one day soon.
